

Where to go: People and Power (on the second floor of the Cabildo) and the Cabildo's courtyard



On March 21, 1788, a fire started by candles in a home spread across the city and destroyed over 800 buildings. The Cabildo was one of the buildings damaged. The Cabildo was damaged again by a second, smaller fire in 1794 that destroyed over 200 buildings. After these two fires, Spanish officials who met in this building put laws in place to prevent future fires.

WHAT IS ARCHAEOLOGY?





Archaeology is the study of things that people made, used, and left behind. The goal of archaeology is to understand what people of the past were like and how they lived. Scientists who study archaeology are called archaeologists.*

An archaeologist's work begins with finding a site to study. Some archaeological sites, such as ancient cities, are visible on the surface. Other sites are buried deep beneath the ground. After finding a site, an archaeologist digs slowly and carefully. This work is called excavation, or a "dig." *kids.britannica.com

DID YOU KNOW?

Tiny clues can help archaeologists learn about life in the past. By identifying the bones they found, archaeologists learned which cuts of meat prisoners were eating. In this drawing, the black bones were the ones found at the Cabildo.






Archaeologists also found several metal mustaches in the Cabildo courtyard.

THE COURTYARD

One of the archaeologists' excavation pits was located near the anchor. Before the 183Os, this part of the courtyard was a row of jail cells. In this map, the thing black line is the edge of today's courtyard. The thick gray lines show the walls of the 173O prison. The red boxes are where archaeologists dug. Can you find their locations?

BLUE BEADS

Central Africa held traditions of wearing colorful beads either as jewelry or as a protective charm. In some West African cultures, blue beads were worn by children to keep away illness. The beads could be worn on a string around the child's belly, or on an anklet. When people from across Africa were enslaved and brought to the New World, traditions from different cultures were combined. Blue beads are often found by archaeologists where enslaved people lived throughout the United States and in the Caribbean.

What was the building in 1988?


REVIEW:
